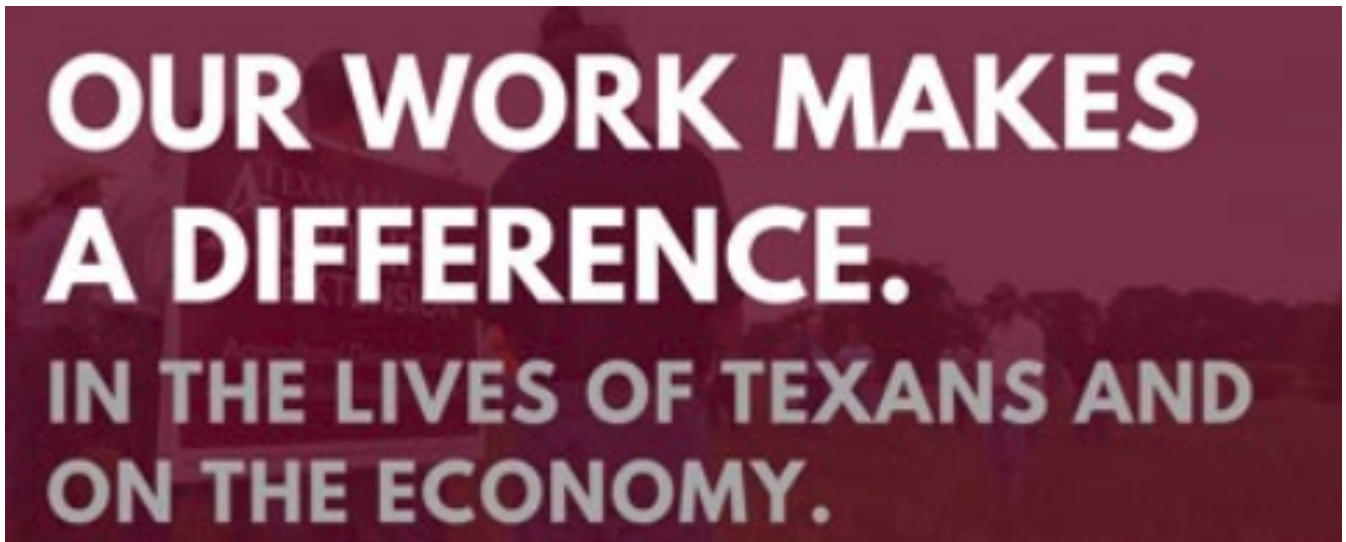

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DISASTER ASSESSMENT & RECOVERY

The Disaster Assessment and Recovery Agent (D.A.R Agent) is a position developed to assist local and state governments with ensuring communities are educated through training and activities for planned and unplanned disasters. D.A.R Agents have and will continue to assist with Covid-19 recovery operations.

D.A.R agents have teamed up with Texas Engineering Extension Service (T.E.E.X), South East Texas Regional Advisory Council (S.E.T.R.A.C), local municipalities, and the Texas National Guard to complete all tasks handed down by the State of Texas and the Texas Department of Emergency Management (T.D.E.M). During the beginning of the epidemic, agents assisted the state by helping to provide secure transportation of all Covid-19 tests to labs in Austin, TX. Once testing became more manageable at the local level, agents assisted with personal protective equipment distribution to local first responders, day cares, schools, and health care facilities throughout Harris and surrounding counties.

D.A.R. agents have also assisted with helping school districts with administering rapid Covid-19 tests to students and teachers, ensuring a safer environment within schools. During the Covid-19 epidemic several D.A.R. agents were deployed to assist with assessing damage caused by hurricanes Beta and Delta.

LIVESTOCK VALIDATIONS

During the last few months, Harris County has been busy with validations for the major livestock shows in 2021.

Each year, students from across Harris County purchase livestock consisting of swine, cattle, sheep, goats as well as poultry and rabbits. But, before the youth can show, they must attend their specific validation. At that time, the animals are tagged for identification, have hair pulled for DNA and nose printed.

Major shows include

- Fort Worth Stockshow & Rodeo
- San Angelo Stockshow & Rodeo
- San Antonio Stockshow & Rodeo
- Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo
- Rodeo Austin

Even with the challenges of Covid, major shows are finding ways to allow kids to showcase their hard work while following CDC guidelines for safety. These shows help the youth learn time management, responsibility, communication skills and much more. In Harris County this year, around 300 head of livestock were validated. We wish the kids the best.

Livestock Judging - Evaluation of market and breeding characteristics in Livestock.

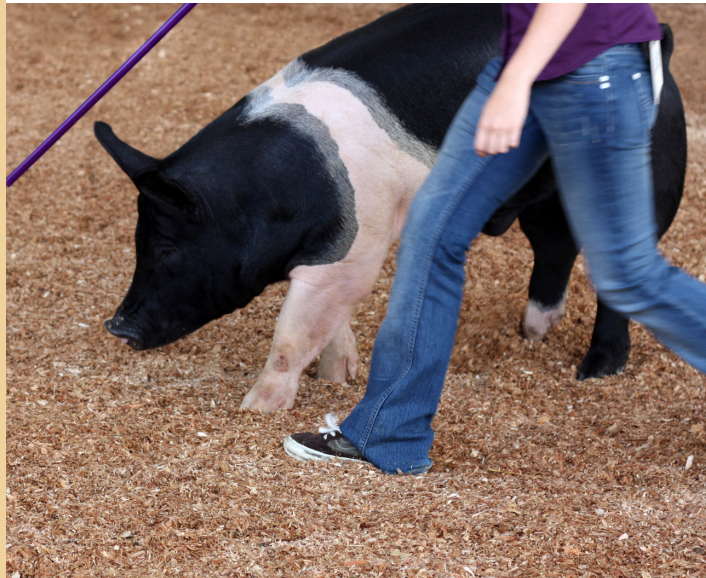
Meat Identification - Identifying the different type of meats like ribeye, flank steak, brisket, and much more.

Ag Product ID - Youth identify different agricultural products from all over Texas.



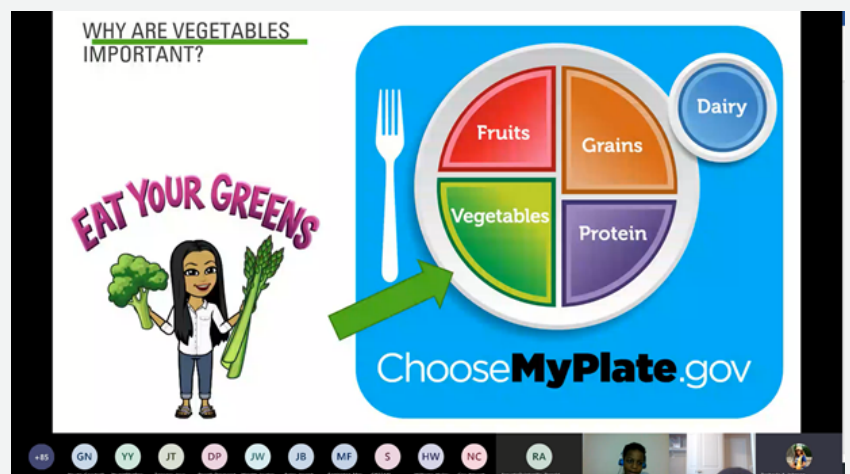
Agriculture in the Classroom

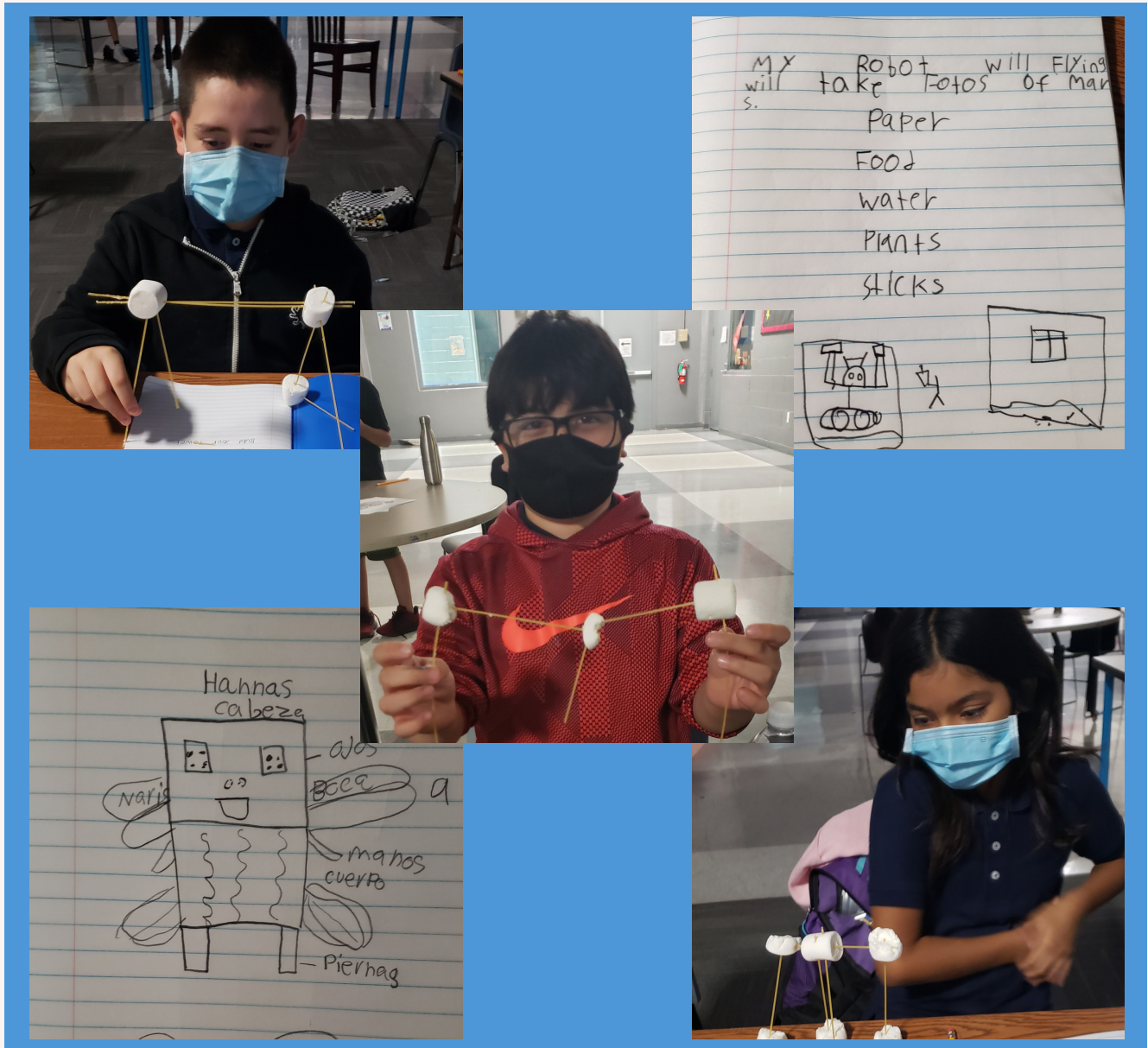
Each Thursday, she met virtually with the students in grades first through fifth grade from Valley West Elementary school. The smallest number of students met with was 91 and the largest number was 157.

Throughout the year, the 4-H department has been working in partnership with the YMCA of Greater Houston, the Boys and Girls Club of Greater Houston, and Girls Inc. through the Imagine Science Grant to provide STEM programming for Harris County Youth.

This fall, the department partnered with four Boys and Girls Clubs to teach youth through an interactive virtual series, **Mars Base Camp**. In this series, youth have been joining in and working together using the engineering process to design their Mars watch towers, sketch prototypes of a Mars rover, and explore the surface of Mars through interactive games. During this, they learn about current Mars missions, scientific facts and definitions associated with Mars, and also talk about STEM related career paths associated with space and planetary exploration.

The program was developed to provide individuals living with diabetes with information to empower them to remain in control of their blood sugar during the holidays when an overabundance of high carbohydrate foods are consumed.

Topics discussed were meal planning, water consumption, surviving holiday parties, mindful eating, and coping with the Holiday Blues. Better Living for Texans Extension Agents, Jorgensen and Brown conducted live food demonstrations of healthier options for traditional side dishes such as dressing, sweet potatoes, and green bean casserole. Participants really enjoyed the presenters and the information shared to remain healthy in control of their blood glucose during the holiday season.

Agents Davis and Krippele conducted a virtual Diabetes Self-Management Series that met twice a week from September 8th- October 1st. The agents were approached by representatives from Methodist Hospital who noticed an increase in hospitalizations related to diabetes. This series was developed to provide information for individuals living with Type II diabetes to manage their blood glucose during the pandemic.

The series was conducted in 8, one-hour sessions during the 4-week period with an average of 20 participants each session. The Teams platform allowed for live interaction and participation between the attendees and the presenters. If participants missed class, they received a YouTube link to view the recorded class to ensure they did not fall behind and allow for questions if they had any during the following class. Weekly sessions provided participants with information on understanding diabetes, knowing the difference between high and low carb foods, blood glucose readings, treating low blood glucose, the healthy plate method, reading nutrition facts labels and carb counts.

Participants set weekly goals and completed homework assignments related to the 7 Diabetes Self Care Steps: eat healthy, move more, check your blood glucose, check eyes, teeth and feet, take medication, see your doctor and manage stress.

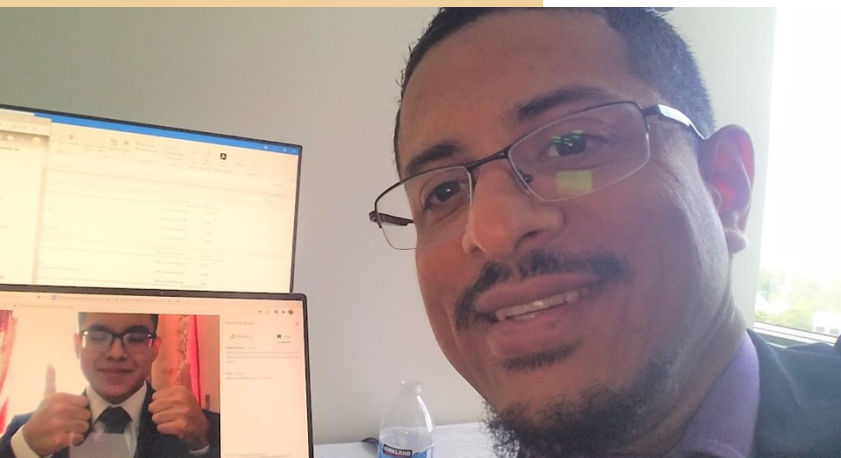
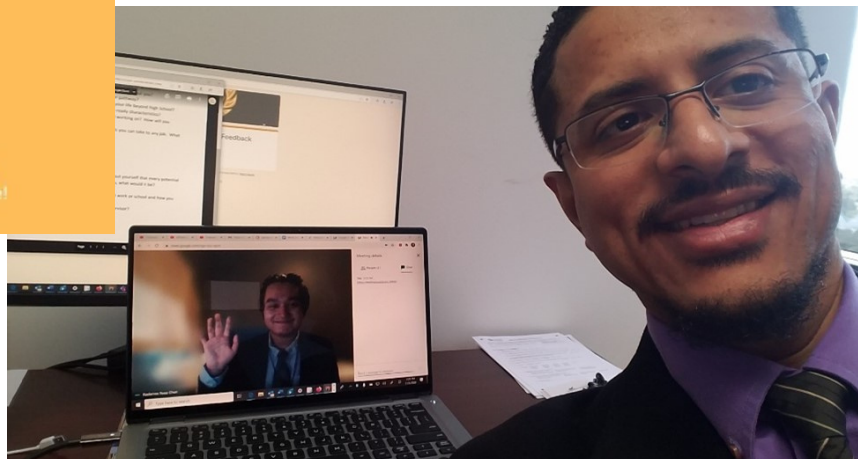

Nutrition Educators from Harris County Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP) have begun a live, virtual weekly food demonstration and culinary skill series. These live virtual meetings help community members learn easy, nutritious recipes and useful culinary skills from a real-life nutrition educator from the safety of their homes. Demonstrations last approximately 15 minutes. Any community member is welcome to log in and learn! Demonstrations are held every Wednesday afternoon at 2pm (central) via Zoom. And the 3rd Wednesday of each month is dedicated to a recipe or skill that great for kids!

Harris County Better Living for Texans Partners with the YMCA.

HARRIS COUNTY BLT AGENTS LORA JORGENSEN & KRISTINA BROWN

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Harris County's Better Living for Texans (BLT) program is funded by the USDA's SNAP-Ed program, the Texas Department of Health & Human Services, and Harris County, to bring research and evidence-based nutrition, health, and wellness education to our community.

As virtual program delivery took the place of face-to-face programming this fall, Harris County BLT Agents Lora Jorgensen and Kristina Brown partnered with The YMCA of Greater Houston to bring three nutrition and wellness programs to the YMCA's ForeverWell senior program. These virtual programs consisted of one hour live educational sessions delivered monthly from September through November on the YMCA's private Zoom platform and covered a wide range of wellness topics.

Food Safety- Avoiding Foodborne Illness, was attended by 45 participants, and taught how to decrease the risk of food poisoning by using the FDA's safe food handling recommendations of Cook-Clean-Separate-Chill.

Focus on Fruits and Vegetables was attended by 36 participants, and explained the health benefits of eating the USDA's recommended daily servings, as well as strategies to get more fruits and vegetables into ones' diet.

Finally, Healthier Holiday Side Dishes, which is scheduled before Thanksgiving, taught participants tips for cooking holiday dishes that include more whole grains, and less sugar, fat, and sodium. A selection of healthier recipes will be shared with participants, just in time for holiday cooking.

The “Chat with Green Aggies” is a free, weekly online webinar for the green industry of Texas. The program (weekly multi-panelist webinar) is unique in its multi-discipline holistic approach, specialist-agent-industry collaboration, nationally-known guest panelists, combination of in-depth and informal discussions, and regular consistent delivery of timely topics. With Texas Nursey and Landscape Association being a major industry collaborator, the interdisciplinary team consists of faculty from Horticulture, Plant Pathology, Entomology, Soil and Crop Sciences, horticulture agents from two major metropolitan areas (Tarrant and Harris Co.), and a scientist from a major Industry company. With a combined 60 years of service with Texas A&M AgriLife Extension (out of a combined 90+ years with Extension in general), the Team has become the preeminent source of information on plant-centered topics for the nursery and landscape industry in Texas.

Creating School Gardens Workshop

On July 31, 2020, we presented a 3-hour Creating School Gardens Workshop to 89 educators. This was a multi-county collaboration between Harris, Brazos, and Brazoria counties with four speakers and five topics. Gardening continues to grow in popularity with both homeowners and those in formal education. Bringing gardens to schools allows students to learn how to garden, learn where food comes from, and how it can provide nutrition.

There were three main themes to the workshop: planning, planting, and troubleshooting. In the first section, participants learned that proper planning and the presence of a strong support system are key to a sustainable, successful garden. The second section covered a how-to of soil, raised and container gardens, and easy vegetables and herbs to plant. In the last section, we discussed common garden challenges and maintenance. One participant stated, "One of the best workshops I've attended, I would encourage anyone in school/community gardens to view. Great speakers and visual aids."

Speakers included Harris County Master Gardener Program Coordinator – Brandi Keller, Harris County Master Gardener – Will Isbell, Brazos County Extension Agent – Skip Richter, and Brazoria County Extension Agent – Stephen Brueggerhoff.

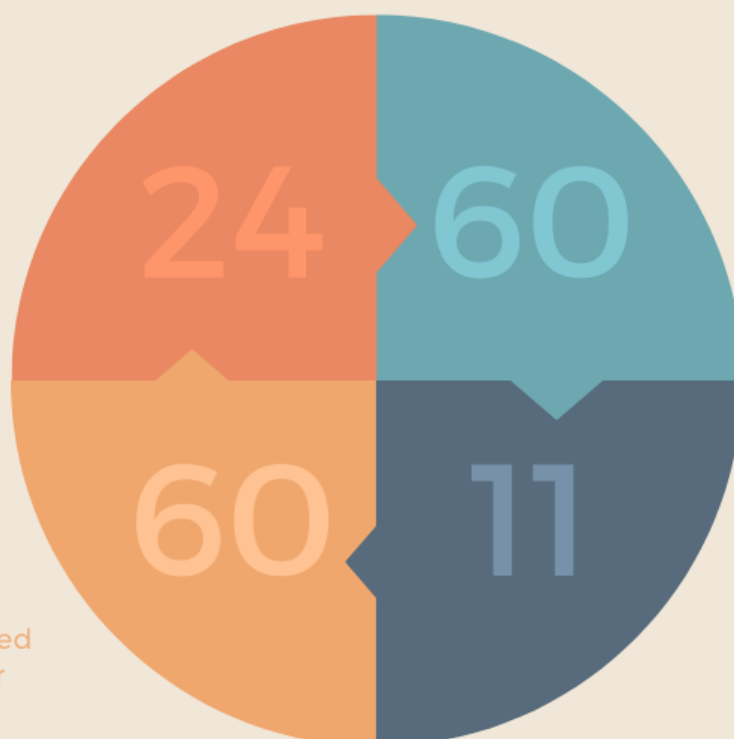

The series titled, “Texas Landowner Educational Series” was conducted over a 5-week span beginning on Thursday, October 8, 2020. Additional classes were held on each following Thursdays at the same time, 1:30 pm – 2:30 pm via Microsoft Teams.

Harris County Agriculture Agent, Shannon Dietz, hosted each session along with invited speakers from agencies who provided researched-based, timely information to the 27 participants. Speakers and their topics included:
