

Tips for Getting your Lawn & Landscape Through the Summer Heat by Paul Winski, Harris County Extension Agent, Horticulture






- MULCH Maintaining a 3" layer of much will significantly reduce the amount of water required in the landscape. Mulching also helps prevent weeds, modifies the soil temperatures and is a source of organic matter as it decomposes over time.
- IRRIGATION AUDIT Assess your system's
   efficiency and effectiveness by identifying
   leaks, and damaged or misaligned sprinkler
   heads. Measuring the output and coverage of
   your system will help determine if the coverage
   is uniform and how long each cycle should be
   run.
- WATER MY YARD APP a free app that uses local weather data to provide weekly watering advice. Receive weekly updates for your specific lawn and irrigation system. Save some money and grow a healthy lawn. https://watermyyard.org/#/Location

# Tips for Getting your Lawn & Landscape Through the Summer Heat by Paul Winski, Harris County Extension Agent, Horticulture

- CYCLE SOAK WATERING Program your irrigation system to split the run times into several shorter cycles to save water. It also allows more time for the water to soak into the soil profile and minimizes sprinkler runoff.
- DEEP INFREQUENT WATERING Deep watering of trees and shrubs results in the development of a deeper root system. The result is a hardier plant that can withstand drought conditions. Shallow frequent watering creates a root system that doesn't respond well to dry conditions and the plant suffers.



## Master Gardener Stinky Corpse Flower Bloomed! by Brandi Keller, Harris County Extension Agent, Horticulture

Why would anyone care about a large, weird flower that is known to smell of rot? Among all the seriousness of life these days, growing plants for food, or taking care of lawn and landscaping at home - sometimes we just need something different to enjoy. Elephant foot yam or *Amorphophallus paeoniifolius* is that different thing we did not know we needed. It does not grow 8 feet tall like *A. titanum*, but it is one of the larger corpse flowers at 18-20 inches in height. Other common names include voodoo lily and corpse flower.







#### **Vegetative Growth**

Years prior to flower, the perennial tuber sends out palm-like growth, growing up to 5 feet tall. Despite appearing like multiple leaves, it is a single leaf blade that splits and divides. It perfers part shade.

First Bud

It can take up to 5 years for the tuber to get large enough to bloom from seed, and as little as 3 years if fertilized properly. It can then bloom each following year if watered properly and fertilized. Mulch helps.

#### **Fantastic Flower**

Frilly modified leaves skirt the reproductive parts. Male and female yellow flowers adorn the base of the spadix, while the top brainlike structure creates heat It volatizes chemicals and is the source of stink.

This specimen bloomed for the first time in four years in June at the Harris County Master Gardener Demonstation Gardens. Once fully open, the unique flower only lasted a couple days. The rotten smell is strongest in the evening and peaks during a 2-hour timeframe. It brought plenty of excitement, but also new visitors to the gardens. You can visit Monday and Wednesday mornings between 9am and noon. Genoa Friendship Gardens is located at 1202 Genoa Red Bluff Road, Houston 77034.
